II. INTRODUCTION

II.1 Mission

Instruct, perfect and evaluate the Officers, non-commissioned officers and civilian personnel of the National Army, the National Navy, Uruguayan Air Force and the Ministry of Interior for the accomplishment of Peacekeeping Operations abroad, integrating Forces from United Nations (UN) and/or International Treaties.

Advise SINOMAPA, General Staff of Defense and the Ministry of Defense, in matters of instruction and training for PKO.

To carry out collection and processing of information about our participation in the PKO, with the purpose of its consideration and affectation to the doctrine of the Force.

II.2 Historical review

After periods of instability in South America, the states began to rehearse international attempts to find solutions for the controversy between countries, by non-violent means.

In this context, due to the conflict between the Republics of Bolivia and Paraguay for the so-called *Chaco Boreal*, Uruguay participated in 1928 in the separation of the opposing forces by occupying small forts in the ground, with two Senior Officers, as a guarantee for both sides, participating later in the peace talks in 1929.

Subsequently, in the year 1935, Uruguay sent a group of Military Observers from its National Army, which is the first participation in the history of this kind.

In the year 1945 the United Nations organization is created (UN). This way, wearing the blue helmet, since 1952 the country contributes with Military Observers, initially from the National Army, to be deployed to the territory of Kashmir, on the Indian-Pakistani border.

The international participation continued increasing and by 1982, a unit transport from the National Army was deployed to the Sinai Peninsula, integrating the Multinational Force & Observers (MFO), established as consequences of the **Camp David Accords**, between the Republics of Egypt, Israel and United States of America. This establishes the first deployment of a large contingent of Uruguayan troops to another continent, performing peacekeeping operations.

To carry out this mission, the personnel were voluntarily called upon and then a selection was made to occupy the different specialties with those who demonstrated better qualifications. Completed this, a specific training began for approximately nine months, in charge of future Commanders of the fractions, nucleated in the **Army Weapons and Services**

School, currently named the **Army School of Weapons and Specialties**. This marked the first precedent of training focused on fulfilling a peace mission.

Along those years, Uruguay also integrates the group of nations which participate in the Antarctic Treaty, and from that moment it starts to operate a permanent Base within the Antarctic Circle.


On the other hand, during this time, the UN Security Council increasingly requested for military observers and military contingents to be deployed to different parts of the world. Thus, since 1992, the government authorized the Armed Forces to start creating battalion-level units intended for Cambodia (UNTAC), Mozambique (ONUMOZ) and Angola (UNAVEM III), with the Army having a predominant role. Also, the increasingly complex operations to be fulfilled gave birth to the **National Support System for Peacekeeping Operations** (SINOMAPA, for its Spanish acronym) in 1994. This system reported to the Ministry of Defense and had representatives of the different ministries deemed convenient, as well as from the Navy and Police General Staff.

In this way, and because of the increasing need for having Officers and NCOs trained specifically for this type of operations, the decision to create an Institute for the purposes of this preparation was made. In 1995, the **Army Peace Operations Training Center** (CIOPE, for its Spanish acronym) was created under the guidance of the Army General Staff. At this center, existing experience was gathered, and it opened its doors to the rest of the Armed Forces. This new development led to the creation of the **Uruguayan Army School of Peace Operations** (EOPE, for its Spanish acronym) in 1998, based on the CIOPE.

With the turn of the new millennium, a Battalion was deployed in 2000 to the Democratic Republic of the Congo (MONUC) and to the Republic of Haiti (MINUSTAH) in 2004. Along with the troops in the Sinai Peninsula (MFO), they made up a human capital to peace missions which represented considerable effort for a nation of only 3 million inhabitants.

In 2008, the EOPE became the current **National Peace Operations Training Institute of Uruguay** (ENOPU, for its Spanish acronym) which included senior positions coming from the three Armed Forces.

II.4 ENOPU's Code of Conduct

- **Respect:** Students and School Staff shall have behaviors which show respect and for the rights of property and safety for themselves and others.
- **Responsibility:** Students and School Staff shall take the personal responsibility for these behaviors, in order to maintain a, save and productive environment.
- **Rights:** Students and Staff shall honor the rights of others through the learning process and by showing adequate behavior in a context of social responsibility.

The students and staff are expected to:

- Respect and appreciate diversity of others despite their culture, ethnic group, religion, gender, sexual orientation, age, and capabilities.
- Express themselves using adequate social language and gestures.
- Exhibit a behavior which avoids any kind of intimidation, harassment or discrimination.
- Use the properties of the Uruguayan State and the properties of others with reasonable standards of care.
- Promote positive behavior, eliminating any kind of violent acts.
- Attend classes, activities, and events, in a prepared and punctual manner.
- Do not use cellphones in class. They will have to turn them off during classes.

III. COURSES

III.1 United Nations Military Experts on Mission (UNMEM)

Description: On-site course developed throughout educational and practical hours, recognized by the Department of Peacekeeping Operations (DPKO). It is oriented to officers of the Armed Forces and Police, to be prepared for deployment and to fulfill tasks as Military Observers and Officers integrating a headquarter of a UN peacekeeping mission

Objectives:

- Perfect officers of the Armed Forces and the Police for their performance as members of a multinational component in a UN Peacekeeping Mission.

Language: Classes in Spanish/Materials in English

Duration: 4 weeks

Directed to: Officers of the Armed Forces and Police, national and foreign, elected by their corresponding institutions. Selected students must have a basic level of English in order to communicate, present situations, conduct meetings and draft simple documents.

Also, this course will prepare students to perform in those PKO that they have been assigned to.

Date: March 05 to April 06, 2018

III.2 UN PKO National Investigations Officers Training Course (UN PKO NIOTC)

Description: On-site course, developed in didactic and practical classes, it is designed to train the Superior Personnel of the Armed Forces, military and civilian lawyers linked to the Ministries of Defense and Foreign Affairs, foreigners, so that they are able to participate in investigations in United Nations Peacekeeping Missions.

Objectives:

- Train the Superior Staff of the Armed Forces, military and civilian lawyers, in the new regulations and instruments to carry out the research work of the National Investigation Officers, designated in cases of sexual abuse/ exploitation in PKO, within the framework of the "Zero Tolerance" Policy of the UN.

Language: Classes in Spanish/Materials in English

Duration: 1 week

Directed to: Superior Staff of the Armed Forces, military and civil lawyers linked to the Ministries of Defense and Foreign Affairs, foreigners (according pre-existing agreements with the nation involved).

Date: April 09 to April 13, 2018

III.3 UN Tropical Diseases Course (UNTDC/DIMO)

Description: On site course, design to train Health Personnel (Doctors, Nurses, Nurses, etc.) of the Army Health Service, Health Service of the Armed Forces, etc. Military of the Army, Navy, Air Force, National Police, Civilians and Foreigners (who have been appointed to PKO or see providing services in the immediate future).

Objectives:

- Learn to evaluate epidemiology and environmental malaria and vector data and analyze it for program development and resource management.
- Plan preventive measures of the pre-arrival program and design a vector control program.
- Develop efficiency in the diagnosis and clinical management of malaria in adults and children.
- Use a series of exercise tables to develop the evaluation capacity and to design or improve a malaria control program.
- Improve the ability to diagnose, treat and manage additional contemporary severe infectious disease resources that often coexist in regions with malaria.

Language: Classes in Spanish and English/Materials in English. simultaneous translation.

Duration: 1 week

Directed to: Health Personnel (Doctors, Nurses, Nurses, etc.) of the Army Health Service, Health Service of the Armed Forces, etc. Military of the Army, Navy, Air Force, National Police, Civilians, and Foreigners.

Date: April 23 to April 27, 2018

III.4 UN Security Training (UNST)

Description: On-site course developed in didactic classes and practical exercises in the field to train personnel for work in high-risk areas or in situations under threat.

Objectives:

- Train United Nations personnel in Uruguay and the region, personnel of the Armed Forces and the Ministries of National Defense and Foreign Affairs in personal security and security within the United Nations Organization to perform tasks in high-risk areas or in situations under threat.

Language: Classes in Spanish/Materials in English.

Duration: 2 days

Directed to: United Nations personnel in Uruguay and in the region, personnel of the Armed Forces, National Police and Ministries of National Defense and Foreign Affairs.

Date: May 09 and May 10, 2018

III.5 MFO Pre-deployment course for the Special Transport and Engineers

Description: On site-training course developed throughout didactic and practical classes. It is designed to train Officers and NCOs of the Uruguayan Army, according to their specialties, in order to be prepared for the deployment and to fulfill the tasks at the Multinational Force and Observers (MFO) in the Sinai Peninsula.

Objectives:

- To train the personnel integrating the national contingent deployed at the MFO, to fulfill the mandated tasks.
- To improve members of the following components: Command Group, Transport unit, and Engineer's Unit, in an operational environment.

Language: Classes in Spanish

Duration: 3 weeks

Directed to: Officers and NCOs of the Uruguayan Army, according to their specialties and ranks. The designated Officers must have an adequate level of English in order to communicate, present situations, conduct meetings and to draft basic documents in said language.

Date:

June 04 to June 22, 2018

November 05 to November 23, 2018

III.6 Course: Journalist in hostile areas (UNPIC)

Description: The course is delivered in theoretical and practical classes, dealing with situations that could happen during a reporting coverage in a conflict area, aiming to develop good observations skills, analysis of security conditions, crisis management, capacity of work and harmony with the group.

Objectives:

- Introduce the Media Professional workers that perform in areas of conflict and post-conflict with basic theoretical and practical knowledge regarding the characteristics of hostile environments.
- Highlight personal security procedures and the relation between the press and military forces and other organizations in the field.
- Provide the tools to transmit the work of the Armed Forces in UN peacekeeping operations.

Language: Classes in Spanish / Material in English

Duration: 1 week.

Directed to: Officers and NCOs of the Armed Forces and civilians, national and foreign who carry out public relations tasks. For the Media Professional Workers who perform in areas of conflict and post-conflict.

Date: August 20 to August 24, 2018

III.7 Course: Women, Peace, and Security (UNWOM)

Description: The course allows the student to acquire essential knowledge to constitute as advisory bodies for decision making and to gain knowledge of the general rules of Women in the context of PKO.

Objectives:

- To prepare and deploy peace forces trained in women's roles in Missions, gender differences, and women's rights, an important element for the UN peacekeeping operations

Language: Classes in Spanish/Material in English

Duration: 1 week

Directed to: Officers and NCOs of the Armed Forces and Police, and civilians, national and foreign, appointed by their corresponding institutions.

Date: September 10 to September 14, 2018

III.8 UN Civil-Military Coordination (UNCIMIC)

Description: On site-training course developed throughout didactic and practical classes. In the course, students discuss the organization and the operability of the United Nations Organization and peace missions. The course covers theory of current civil-military coordination relevant in our contemporary global context, and the practical work of peacekeepers deployed in peace missions with tasks directly or indirectly linked to civil affairs.

Objectives:

- To prepare and deploy trained peacekeepers in Civil-Military Coordination.
- Training for the fulfillment of key tasks which will allow implementation, daily analysis, and the evaluation of UN-CIMIC related activities.
- Deliver the basic responsibilities that must be understood and applied by future UNCIMIC officers.

Language: Classes in Spanish/Material in English

Duration: 1 week

Directed to: Officer and NCOs of the Armed Forces and Police, and civilians, national and foreign, appointed by their corresponding institutions

Date: October 01 to October 05, 2018

III.9 Course of Child Protection in Armed Conflicts (UNCHILD)

Description: On site-training course developed throughout didactic and practical classes. The course will cover the general aspects of children's rights and child protection, which has become an increasingly important element in UN Peacekeeping Missions

Objectives:

- To prepare and deploy peace forces trained in children's rights and child protection, generating awareness about their problematic in conflict areas.
- Protect minors from the effects of conflict and as a result, create peace forces for the protection of children's rights, established as a key priority for the Department of Peacekeeping Operations (DPKO) and its policy on child protection.
- To train the blue helmets in the identification of violation of children's rights, working with other agents to liberate them from the armed groups.

Language: Classes in Spanish/Material in English

Duration: 1 week

Directed to: Officers and NCOs from the Armed Forces, Police, and Civilians, both national and foreign, appointed by their corresponding institutions.

Date: October 15 to October 19, 2018

III.11 Protection of Civilians (UNPOC)

Description: On site-training course developed throughout didactic and practical classes, which allows students to have an understanding and knowledge of the general aspects of the protection of civilians in the framework of a peace mission.

Objetives:

- To promote on the students, members of the Uruguayan Forces and guests, the interest and critical view on the different aspect related to "Protection of Civilians in the Peacekeeping Operations": the actors, the risks, the threats and tasks to protect the civilians, ensuring the legitimacy and credibility of the mission.
- To get an approach on the dimension of the peacekeeping operations, starred by the military and civilian component in conjunction with the support of the humanitarian agencies, in benefit of the mandate including child protection and attending the cases of sexual violence as a war weapon.
- To exercise the students on the Identification process in different scenarios, its risks and tactical planning for the materialization of an integral concept on Protection of Civilians as members of a tactical General Staff and Commanders up to sub-unit level, conducting Peacekeeping Operations.

Language: Classes in Spanish/Material in English

Duration: 2 weeks

Directed to: Officers and NCOs of the Armed Forces, and Police, and civilians, national and foreign, appointed by their corresponding institutions.

Date: November 12 to November 23, 2018
